<u>Degree Name:</u> **B.S. Human Development and Family Sciences - Child Development Emphasis**We offer 3 areas of study: Parent-Infant Specialist, Child Life Specialist, and Leadership Studies.
Students chose an area of study they are interested in pursuing.

Does the degree lead to a Professional Educator License (PEL)?

This degree is a non-licensure option. NIU does offer a PEL option through the College of Education.

Credentials or other qualifications that can be attained by completing the bachelor degree:

- Gateways to Opportunity Level V Early Childhood Credential
- Gateways to Opportunity Level V Infant Toddler Credential In the parent/infant area of study
- Gateways to Opportunity Level II Director Credential In the leadership studies area of study
- Illinois Developmental Therapist Credential In the parent/infant area of study
- Coursework in the Child Life area of study is aligned to coursework requirements set forth by the Association of Child Life Professionals to sit for the Child Life certification exam

Total credits required to earn the bachelor degree:

120 hours total. Minimum GPA would be 2.0. After the first semester, student would have to be at 2.4 to remain in the program.

Can the bachelor degree be completed 100% online? If not, please note any exceptions.

Students with an A.A.S. degree can complete their degree 100% online. One thing to note, the A.A.S. degree may not cover some general education courses that are required for the NIU bachelor program and may need to be taken in person to complete. They can be taken at NIU or at their community college. Consult a BHC or NIU advisor to assist with course selection.

Students with an A.A. or A.S. degree or 60+ credits, our program is a hybrid combination of in-person classes and online.

Is there an option to complete the bachelor degree in person on your campus?

Yes, with our hybrid model, students can complete the program in person and take classes online.

If attending full-time, how many semesters are needed to complete the bachelor degree?

Depending on the area of study a student chooses, there are one-year and two-year plans for students.

Is part-time attendance possible?

Yes, students have the option to complete their program in one or two years. Two-year plans have fewer classes per semester.

Which semester(s) can the bachelor program be started?

A student can begin their bachelor program in any semester.

How are courses offered (i.e. full-term, 8-week sessions, summer options, etc.)?

Courses are a combination of full-term, 8-week sessions, and summer options.

There is a required minimum of 21 semester hours in the three general education knowledge domains. The three general education knowledge domains are areas of human endeavor (creativity and critical analysis; nature and technology; society and culture).

Proficiency credits (up to 30 credits)

Students who are human development and family science professionals in the incumbent workforce and students graduating from related Associate of Applied Science degree programs may receive credit specific to their discipline and prior learning experiences up to 30 credit hours. These are determined on an individual basis, so please speak with an NIU academic advisor for details.

University graduation and general education requirements

All NIU students must meet university graduation and general education (GE) requirements as listed in the NIU undergraduate catalog. You may have some requirements already met when you are admitted to NIU. All students in this program are required to complete a minimum of 30 credit hours of coursework through NIU. You'll work with an advisor to identify which courses you will need and develop a plan to meet NIU graduation requirements.
